Village Preschool Children Get Healthy Meals through Rotary of Gainesville, Rotary of Western Australia & Village Families

Sustainable Cambodia's village preschool program helps village families create preschools, helping children between 2 and 6 years of age get early education. While children are at the preschool, the parents have more time to work and earn an income to support the family. The central location of the preschool in the village makes it easy for children to attend. And the children get stimulating activities and the fundamentals that are needed for a headstart on a good education.

But nutrition is a major problem. Malnourished children cannot excel mentally or physically. So to provide a great headstart, Rotary of Western Australia has joined Rotary Club of Gainesville, Florida in helping the preschool get a daily nutritious meal. The parents rotate in providing the labor for the meal, while the Rotary clubs help fund some of the ingredients that must be purchased at the local market.

What Rotary and the families are creating is the shared vision of a world in which all can grow up to contribute to a better world.

Sustainable Cambodia is a grass-roots, volunteer-based, Rotary-supported, 501(c)(3) not-for-profit organization, working with rural Cambodian village sustainability and self-sufficiency. Our model is unique in several ways:

- Only native Cambodians are employed as paid staff, and all international officers, directors and consultants are unpaid volunteers, ensuring goes directly into the rural village programs.
- We are an empowerment organization rather than an "Aid" organization. We provide resources, assistance, training and education to the families to revitalize their community and economy.
- Our approach is broad-based, including schooling for children, safe village drinking water, irrigation systems, alternative agriculture, vocat business and healthcare.
